Crucial Conversations

Each year the Alabama Council of Hospital Auxiliaries selects a service project on which to focus. This year, we want to use our collective volunteer voices to encourage our friends, family and fellow volunteers to share with their loved ones their wishes for care through the end of life, so those wishes can be understood and respected.

HOW YOU CAN HELP

Download "Your Conversation Starter Guide" from www.theconversationproject.org. Review this booklet, fill it out as fully as possible and then:

- Share it (your wishes) with your loved ones. It won't do any good to try and promote these conversations unless you have personal experience in having them. If it's important for others, it's important for you.
- Share the guide with your friends and encourage them to have similar discussions.
- Copy it and distribute it at one of your auxiliary meetings. Find someone in your hospital who is passionate about the subject and ask them to come and speak and answer questions (e.g., physician, chaplain).
- Ask that passionate person to speak at your next women's circle, garden club, Rotary meeting.

Visit www.theconversationproject.org where you will find not only the guide mentioned, but also a guide for those with serious illness, a guide for caregivers of children with serious illness, a guide for choosing a healthcare proxy (someone to speak for you if you are too sick or hurt to speak for yourself.

IMPORTANT TIPS

- · You may want more information before answering some of the questions, particularly for medical questions. So, check with your doctor first before completing the booklet.
- Don't feel like you have to make all of the decisions right away, but don't put it off too long either. These discussions need to start happening while we are young. We can always change our minds as we get older and go back and edit our wishes.
- · Once you know what you want, it's a good idea to write it down in a document called an advanced directive. This can be used to tell your family, physician, nurse or other members of your healthcare team what kind of medical care you want if you are too sick or hurt to talk or make decisions. Make sure you give a copy of your directive to your physicians and family members and that you take it with you if you have to go into the hospital.
- · When you talk with others, have copies of both the Conversation Guide and Alabama's Advanced Directive. You can find more information on that at www.alaha.org/advanced-directives.
- Sometimes people may not be ready to have these conversations. If that's the case, you might simply leave the information with them and suggest they contact you if they would like to talk at a later date.
